Karapiro School Animal Welfare Policy





RATIONALE:

Karapiro School recognises that under the Animal Protection Act 1987 it is required to have a policy relating to the welfare and treatment of any animals under its care.

PURPOSES:

- 1. To encourage through example, the proper care of living things within the school situation (see "Science in the NZ Curriculum", Living World section: Achievement Objectives 3 & 4).
- 2. To provide experiences for students to observe, handle and care for a range of animals in a humane way.
- 3. To ensure that the care and welfare of animals must have the highest priority in any activity involving the keeping of an animal or its study on a field trip.
- 4. To educate students through example and discussion on the importance of animal care, welfare and the responsibilities involved.
- 5. To maintain a safe and healthy school environment.

GUIDELINES:

- 1. "Animal" is defined as any living creature with a backbone, including land-based and aquatic mammals, birds, fish and reptiles.
- 2. It is generally accepted that other living creatures such as spiders, snails, worms and insects must also be treated with care and kindness.
- 3. If the appropriate care cannot be provided, the animal is not to be kept in school.
- 4. Creatures kept in classrooms as pets must be housed and fed properly. Frequent cleaning of cages should occur and the person responsible for this task must do so in a well ventilated area and wash their hands thoroughly following the procedure. Veterinary advice will be taken when necessary.
- 5. Creatures kept in classrooms for topic observation must be housed and fed properly, and returned to their natural habitat on completion of the study.
- 6. Creatures captured on field trips must be returned to their habitat prior to leaving the area unless their proper care in the school is guaranteed.
- 7. Animals found unjustifiably on school grounds, are to be dealt with by staff only, as follows:
 - (a) Identifiable Owner will be notified for removal and advised of the following: If incident reoccurs, the Waikato District Council Animal Control Office will be contacted for retrieval and owner shall bear the cost.
 - (b) Non-Identifiable/Wild The Waipa District Council Animal Control Officer will be contacted for removal, or in the case of a wild animal if the B.O.T. is unable to address the problem.

- (c) Dogs are Prohibited on School Grounds – Exceptions to this may include dogs under the control of; the owner for specific school events, a security guard, the NZ Police, a guide dogs.
- 8. Responsibility for the welfare of animals rests with the teacher involved, but ultimately with the Principal and Board.
- 9. At all times this policy operates within the laws of New Zealand relating to the protection of native and/or endangered animals.

The following freedoms apply:

Freedom 1: Animals must have appropriate diet, including access to water.

Provision must be made for care at weekends and over holidays.

Freedom 2: Animals must have cages/containers of an appropriate size, and be

ventilated and hygienic. Animals must not be subjected to extremes

of noise, draught or sunlight.

Freedom 3: Animals must be free from injury or disease. Diseased or injured

animals must be treated, and must not be kept at school.

Freedom 4: Animals must be handled/kept in such a way that they are not

subjected to stress or fear.

Freedom 5: Animals must be able to express normal behaviour.
